Italians (American and European)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Large overpayment partially caused by mismanagement. <p>Total balance: somewhat positive (it allowed me to recover from the previous periods and restart the life).</p>
Germans	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Some overpayment caused by incorrect project requirements and random factors. <p>Total balance: a little positive.</p>
Czechs	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Initially, routine work for standard market rates. • Later, somewhat higher payment; but payer was informed that money will be spent for attempts to enter academic research. Few of my research works were accepted finally as preprints on Western academic resources (without any financial benefit). <p>Total balance: somewhat positive (because of satisfaction from performed research work and long-term stability).</p>
Peripheric partially Islamic societies (from North Africa to South East Asia, from Central Asia to East Africa)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • A lot of money was spent by me for travelling. • Few small projects for standard market rates. • Communication with women ended with nothing because of financial and cultural mismatch. <p>Total balance: very positive just because of impressions from travels.</p>
East Asians	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Some money were spent by me for travelling. <p>Total balance: slightly positive just because of impressions from travels.</p>
Sub-Saharan Africans	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • A lot of money was spent by me for travelling. • Randomly met women turned out to be too problematic. No relationships were built. <p>Total balance: very positive just because of impressions from travels.</p>

Kazakhstan, Uzbekistan	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Few short-term projects for standard market rates. • Some money were spent by me for travelling. <p>Total balance: a little positive just because of impressions from travels.</p>
Kyrgyzstan	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Some money were spent by me for travelling and living there. • Also, I was given a possibility to repatriate there officially because of new laws. • Low cost of living allowed me to live there cheaply and rebuild myself for global social changes. • Few occasional relationships with problematic women. <p>Total balance: somewhat positive.</p>
Modern citizens of Russia	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Routine work for standard market rates. • Some overpayment caused by mismanagement in few companies. <p>Total balance: slightly positive.</p>
Indostan	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Some money were spent by me for travelling. <p>Total balance: very positive just because of impressions from travels.</p>
South East Asia (mainly post-Communistic countries)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • A lot of money was spent by me for travelling. • Relationships with women ended with nothing either because of their age, or because of being too problematic, or because of lack of interest to family life, or because of lack of resources on my side. (Communication was built in the context of relationships in post-Communistic societies. It is mentioned to highlight difference with typical Western tourists travelling there,) <p>Total balance: very positive just because of impressions from travels.</p>

Summary

Relationships with any of aforementioned parts of global society did not result into purchase of real estate, academic career, or making kids.

So, total balance between me and the world may be estimated as “close to zero”.
